Safety Notice: Excavators

The Health and Safety Executive has issued a <u>Safety Notice</u> regarding the risk that people can be struck by an excavator or a load if the excavator operator does not use the safety control lever or isolation device correctly.

The Safety Notice was issued following the fatal crushing of a slinger during a lifting operation. The excavator operator was leaning out of his cab to communicate with the slinger when he inadvertently made contact with the left-hand joystick, causing the excavator to slew. The safety control lever had not been applied to isolate the machine.

The HSE requires duty holders to monitor the application of, and correct use of, the safety control device by excavator operators.

Consultations

DUA Act Guidance

The Information Commissioner's Office has published consultations seeking views on new draft guidance to help clarify incoming data protection law amendments under the Data (Use and Access) Act.

The first draft guidance covers new requirements and procedures for handling <u>data protection</u> <u>complaints</u>, while the second covers "<u>recognised legitimate interest</u>" as a lawful basis for data processing. The first consultation closes on 19th October 2025, the second on 30th October 2025.

Environmental Permitting

The Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs has published a <u>consultation</u> seeking views on proposed reforms to environmental permitting for industry, including:

- enabling innovation and encouraging new technologies and techniques;
- incorporating agile standards into standard setting;
- introducing proportionate regulation and coherence in the environmental permitting framework;
- increasing regulator effectiveness and efficiency; and
- creating a transparent environmental permitting framework

The consultation closes on 21st October 2025.
